Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.¹

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following instructions.

External Antenna Care

If your phone has an external antenna, use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and/or may result in non-compliance with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline phone.

Body-Worn Operation: Voice Communication

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting voice communications, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines.

If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries, antennas, and convertible covers, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

Note: This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your device offers a flight mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about use in flight. If your device offers a feature that automatically turns on the phone, then turn off this feature before boarding an aeroplane or entering an area where the use of wireless devices is restricted.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 centimetres (6 inches) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 15 centimetres (6 inches) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.

- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your doctor may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a phone may be distracting in certain circumstances. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Gas or Petrol Stations

Obey all posted signs with respect to the use of radio equipment in gas or petrol stations. Turn off your wireless device if instructed by authorised staff.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Damaged Products


If your phone or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorised Service Centre to determine if it has been damaged. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

Batteries and Chargers

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become hot. Take care when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original™ batteries and chargers.**

Caution: To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

Your battery, charger, or phone may contain symbols, defined as follows:

Symbol	Definition
	Important safety information will follow.
	Your battery or phone should not be disposed of in a fire.
	Your battery or phone may require recycling in accordance with local laws. Contact your local regulatory authorities for more information.
	Your battery or phone should not be thrown in the trash.
	Your phone contains an internal lithium ion battery.

Choking Hazards

Your phone or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your phone and its accessories away from small children.

Glass Parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service centre.

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone (the flashing-light feature is not available on all products).

Parents should monitor their children's use of video games or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

Caution About High Volume Usage



Listening at full volume to music or voice through a headset may damage your hearing.

Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.

- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

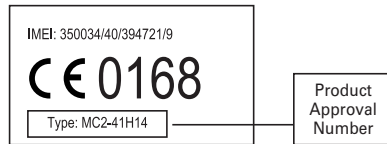

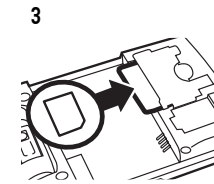
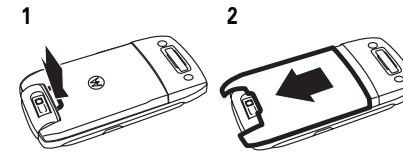
SIM card

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries. It can also contain your voicemail, text message, and Internet access settings. If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

To insert and use a **memory card**, see page 43.

Turn off your phone and remove your battery before you install or remove a SIM card.



battery

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



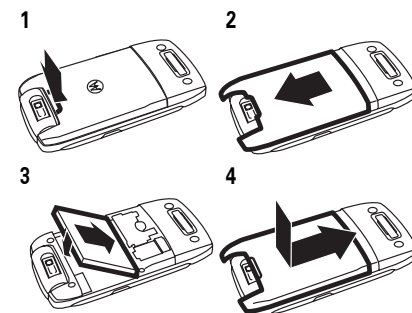
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.

Contact your local recycling centre for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Before using your phone, read the battery safety information in the "Safety and General Information" section included in this guide.

battery installation



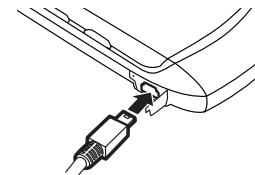
battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the battery. Your display shows **Charge complete** when finished.

Your phone's battery charging indicator lights up while the battery is charging, and turns off when the battery is fully charged.

Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

The battery charger shipped with this device is designed for Motorola 3G mobile phones.

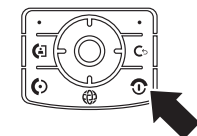



Other chargers might take longer to charge your battery, or cause your calls to fail during charging.

turn it on & off


Caution: Some phones ask for your SIM card PIN code when you turn them on. If you enter an incorrect PIN code three times before the correct code, your SIM card is disabled, and your display shows **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.


To turn on your phone, press and hold for a few seconds or until the keypad or display lights up. If prompted, enter your eight-digit SIM card PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.



To turn off your phone, press and hold  for a few seconds.


make a call


Enter a phone number and press  to make a call.

To “hang up,” close the flip or press .

To make video calls, see page 41.


answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press  to answer.



To “hang up,” close the flip or press .

store a phone number



You can store a phone number in your **Phonebook**:

- 1 Enter a phone number in the home screen.
- 2 Press the **Store** key.
Select **Create New Contact**, if necessary.
- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press the centre key .
- 4 Press the **Done** key to store the number.

To store an email address from the home screen, press  >  **Phonebook** > **New Entry**. Enter the new contact’s name and email information.



call a stored phone number

Find it:  >  **Phonebook**



- 1 Scroll to the phonebook entry.

Shortcut: In the phonebook, press keypad keys to enter the first letters of an entry you want.



- 2 Press  to call the entry.

Note: Your phonebook can show you the entries stored in your phone’s memory or on your SIM card. To choose which entries you see, press  >  **Phonebook**, then press **Options** > **View**. You can select **Phone & SIM Card**, **SIM Card**, or **Phone Contacts**.

your phone number

From the home screen, press the *clear key*  then  to see your number.

Tip: Want to see your phone number while you’re on a call? Press **Options** > **My Tel. Number**.

You can edit the name and phone number stored on your SIM card. From the home screen, press  , select an entry, press the **View** key, press the **Options** key, and select **Edit**. If you don’t know your phone number, contact your service provider.



main attractions

You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls!

Bluetooth™ wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless connections. You can connect your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit to make handsfree calls. You can also connect your phone with a phone or computer that supports Bluetooth connections to exchange files.

You can also use Bluetooth™ A2DP stereo headphones to listen to music files you store on your phone.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a

call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.


For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

use a headset or handsfree car kit




Before you try to connect your phone with a handsfree device, make sure the device is on and **ready** in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the user's guide for the device).

- 2 Press **Options**, then select:
 - **Manage > Copy** for media files.
 - **Send Contact** for phonebook entries.
 - **Send** for datebook events.
- 3 Select a recognised device name, or select **[Look For Devices]** to search for the device where you want to copy the file.



If your phone could not copy the file to the other device, make sure the device is on and **ready** in *discoverable* mode (see the user's guide for the device). Also, make sure the device is not busy with another similar Bluetooth connection.

Note: Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, that device can start similar Bluetooth connections with your phone. Your display shows the Bluetooth indicator  at the top when there is a Bluetooth connection. To change a device's access setting, see page 33.

receive files from another device


If you do not see the Bluetooth indicator  at the top of your phone display, turn on your phone's Bluetooth feature by pressing  >  **Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > Setup > Power > On**.


- 1 Place your phone near the device, and send the file from the device.

If your phone and the sending device don't recognise each other, place your phone in discoverable mode so the sending device can locate it. Press  >  **Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > [Find Me]**.
- 2 Press the **Accept** key on your phone to accept the file from the other device.

Find it:  >  **Settings > Connection > Bluetooth Link > [Add Audio Device]** 

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- 1 Scroll to a device in the list and press the centre key .
- 2 Press the **Yes** or **Ok** key to connect to the device.
- 3 If necessary, enter the device passkey (such as **0000**) and press the **Ok** key.

When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator  shows in the home screen, and the external Bluetooth indicator light flashes.


You cannot play some copyrighted files over a Bluetooth connection.

Shortcut: When Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a handsfree device you have used before. Just

turn on the device or move it near the phone. During a call or while playing a sound file, you can press **Options > Use Bluetooth** to connect to a headset or handsfree device you have used before.

Tip: Want to know more about your headset or car kit? For specific information about a device, refer to the instructions that came with it.

copy files to another device


You can copy a media file, phonebook entry, datebook event, or Web shortcut from your phone to a computer or other device. 

Note: You can't copy some copyrighted objects.

- 1 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to copy to the other device.

Your phone notifies you when file transfer is complete. If necessary, press the **Save** key to save the file.

send files to a printer

You can use a Bluetooth connection to send a picture, message, phonebook entry, or datebook view from your phone to a printer. 

Note: You cannot print message **Templates** or a phonebook **Mailing List**.

- 1 On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to print, then press **Options > Print > Bluetooth**. In the datebook, you can print the month, week, or day.




Tip: If you see it, you can print it. After you capture a picture in the camera, you can press the **Options** key and select **Print**.
- 2 If available, choose additional objects or print options.

- 3 Select a recognised printer name listed in the **Printers** menu, or **[Look For Devices]** to search for the printer where you want to print the object.

Note: If you see **Service not Supported** when you try to print, select **Options > Manage > Copy > Bluetooth** instead. Always use this option to print 4x6 photos.

- **Hide the player** by pressing Options > Hide. This lets you use other phone features while the song plays. To stop the hidden audio player, press [] in the home screen.

Tip: You can listen to tunes on your way. You can use Bluetooth™ A2DP stereo headphones (page 28), and use *aeroplane mode* to make your phone safe to use even while you're on a plane (page 94).

Your phone also has a Ring Tones player. To use it, press •> Multimedia > Media Finder > Ring Tones.

audio player

Your phone can play and store AU, WMA, and MP3 song files. You can use a removable memory card with your phone to store more songs (see page 43).

load music files

To download songs from the Internet, see page 93. To copy files between your phone and a computer, see page 46.

Note: Your phone may not play MP3 files that have a bit rate higher than 128 kbps. If you try to download or play one of these files, your phone might show you an error or ask you to delete the file.

connect your memory card to a computer

You can use a cable connection to access your phone's memory card with a PC.

Note: When your phone is connected to a computer, you can only access the memory card through the computer.

On your phone:

Disconnect the cable from your phone, if it is connected, then press ⌂ > ⚙️ **Settings** > **Connection** > **USB Settings** > **Default Connection** > **Memory Card**.

This directs the USB connection to your memory card.

Connect the cable to your phone and to an available USB port on your computer. Then follow these steps:

store and use protected content

- 2 Click on the "Removable Disk" icon to access the files on your phone's memory card.
- 3 To store the desired files onto the memory card, drag and drop them as follows:

wallpapers: > mobile > picture
video clips: > mobile > video
- 4 When you finish, disconnect your phone by selecting the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray at the bottom of your computer screen. Then disconnect the "USB Mass Storage Device."

For example, a licence may allow you to play the content of your download five times or use the content for three days before it expires.

You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.

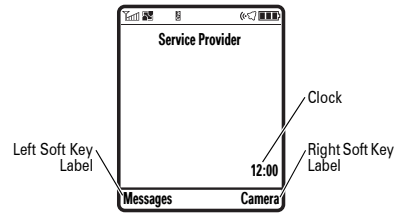

display

The *home screen* shows when you turn on the phone.



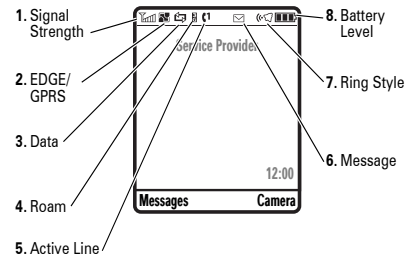
Note: Your home screen might look different from the one shown, depending on your service provider.

To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and **Call**.

Press **Up**, **Down**, **Left**, or **Right** in the home screen to open basic menu features.

Press the centre key **Menu** to open the menu. *Soft Key Labels* show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Status indicators can show at the top of the home screen:



- 1 Signal Strength Indicator** – Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when **Y** or **Y0** shows.
- 2 EDGE/GPRS Indicator** – Shows when your phone is using a high-speed *Enhanced Data for GSM Evolution* (EDGE) or *General Packet Radio Service* (GPRS) network connection. Indicators can include:

- GPRS PDP context active
- EDGE
- GPRS packet data available

- 3 Data Indicator** – Shows connection status.

- secure packet data transfer
- unsecure packet data transfer
- secure application connection
- unsecure application connection
- secure *Circuit Switch Data* (CSD) call
- unsecure CSD call

High-Speed Downlink Packet Access (HSDPA) data transfer

Bluetooth™ connection is active

- 4 Roam Indicator** – Shows when your phone is seeking or using a network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

- 2G home
- 2G roam
- 2.5G home
- 2.5G roam
- 3G home
- 3G roam
- HSDPA home
- HSDPA roam

HSDPA is *High-Speed Downlink Packet Access*, available on some networks.

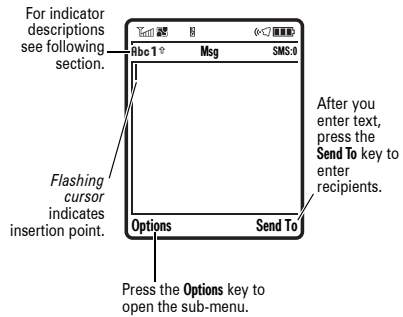

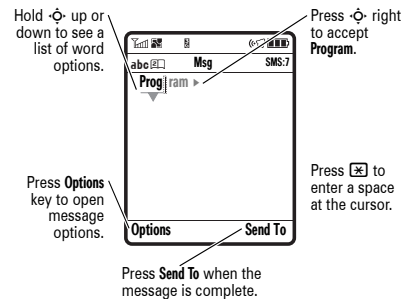

To set your primary and secondary text entry modes, press **Options > Text Setup** in a text entry view and select **Primary Text** or **Secondary Text**.

For example, if you press **[7] [7] [6] [4]**, your display shows:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.

Tip: Don't worry if you forget how iTAP works. In a text entry display, you can press **Options > Text Setup > Text Tutorial** to see an explanation.

tap and tap extended modes

Press **[#]** in a text entry view to switch to tap mode. If you don't see **Abc 1** or **Abc 2**, press **Options > Text Setup** to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

To enter text in **TAP** mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter. The **Tap Extended** mode works the same way, but includes more special characters and symbols.

iTAP™ and Tap mode tips

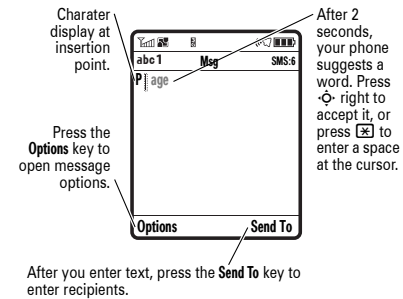
- Press **[0]** in a text entry view to change text case to all capital letters (**ABC**), no capitals (**abc**), or next letter capital (**Abc**).
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP or Tap mode.
- Press **[1]** to enter punctuation or other characters.
- Press **[Left]** to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- Press **[Delete]** to delete the character to the left of the cursor. Hold **[Delete]** to delete the word.
- To cancel your message, press **[Cancel]**.

iTAP™ mode

Press **[#]** in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see **[1]** or **[2]**, press **Options > Text Setup** to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press **[7]** one time, your display shows:



The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press **[Down]** down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.

numeric mode

Press **[#]** in a text entry view until you see **123**. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.

The smart key usually does the same thing as pressing the centre key . To find the smart key, see page 1. To change what the smart key does in the home screen, see page 84.

To **manually lock** your phone:
Press  >  **Settings** > **Security** > **Phone Lock** > **Lock Now**.

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press  >  **Settings** > **Security** > **Phone Lock** > **Automatic Lock** > **On**.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 68). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

lock & unlock external keys

external display

set phone ring style in external display

To change how long your phone waits before it automatically locks your external keys:



If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

The ring style profile's indicator shows at the top of your home screen. To choose your profile:

To choose an **analogue, digital, or no** clock for your home screen, press **Settings** > **Personalise** > **Home Screen** > **Clock**.

wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Note: Your theme can also set your wallpaper (page 63).

Find it: **Settings** > **Personalise**
> **Wallpaper**

Picture	Press up or down to select a picture, or select None for no wallpaper.

Shortcut: In the **home screen**, press the volume keys up or down to quickly change your ring style profile. With your **phone closed**, press a volume key to see your ring style profile, press the smart key to change it, then press a volume key to store the change.

Tip: This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

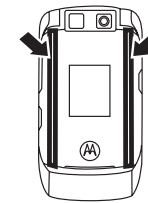

Your phone needs the time and date for the datebook.

To **synchronise** the time and date with the network: Press **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Time and Date** > **Autoupdate** > **On**.

To **manually** set the time and date, turn off **Autoupdate**, then: Press **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Time and Date** > *time* or *date*.

To **delete themes you downloaded**, press **Multimedia** > **Themes**, scroll to the theme, and press **Options** > **Delete** or **Delete All**.



To **preview** a theme, press **Multimedia** > **Themes**, scroll to the theme, and press **Options** > **Preview**.



display appearance

To choose a phone **skin** that sets the look and feel of your phone's display: Press **Settings** > **Personalise** > **Skin**. Your theme can also set your phone skin (page 63).



To set your display **brightness**: Press **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Brightness**.

To save battery life, your keypad **backlight** turns off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the backlight turns off:

Press  >  **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Backlight**.

Note: To turn the backlight on or off for Java™ applications, press  >  **Settings** > **Java Settings** > **App Backlight**.

To save battery life, the **display** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The display turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the display turns off:

Press  >  **Settings** > **Initial Setup** > **Display Timeout**.

You can use different ways to answer an incoming call. To turn on or turn off an answer option:

recent calls

redial


- 1 Press  from the home screen to see a list of recent calls.
- 2 Scroll to the entry you want to call, then press .

If you hear a **busy signal**, and you see  **Call Failed**, you can press  or the **Retry** key to redial the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, shows **Redial Successful**, and connects the call.


return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and shows **X Missed Calls**, where **X** is the number of missed calls.
